PROPOSAL FOR A NEW COURSE

Course Proposal: "The Law in World Law/Justice"

I. Introduction.

The course is considered to be a logical and timely extension of three other courses in the department, which provide a background for a world approach to problems of law and justice. These include: Criminal Justice and the Law, which deals with the history and philosophy of law; Criminal Justice and Social Conflict, which deals with current social conflicts and their impact on the criminal justice system; and Trends in Criminal Justice, which deals with planning to improve the criminal justice system.

These three courses approach problems in criminal justice from a state, regional, or national viewpoint. However, there is an increasing literature in the field which suggests that these law/justice and related social problems need to be viewed from a world vantage point. In this approach, emphasis is placed upon universal concepts, and these are then applied to the problem to attempt syncretic and world-wide solutions. Thus, there is an emerging need for students in law/justice to study and consider world approaches as contrasted with the more limited national or state approach.

II. Department Chairperson's Statement.

A. This course is needed at the present time in order to provide law/justice students with a dimension of outlook which cannot well be presented in the more basic courses. We anticipate that this course will stimulate students to explore a universal conceptual approach to problem solving, and to consider alternative world models in law/justice systems of the future.

B. Suggested time of Offering.

Fall, 1975

"Prerequisites: At least six (6) semester hours of credits from the courses listed as part of the Transnational Studies Tract of the World Studies Concentration; and at least six (6) semester hours from among the following Law/Justice courses: Survey of Criminal Justice, Criminal Justice and the Law, Criminal Justice and Social Conflict, the Political Prisoner, and Trends in Criminal Justice.

I hope that your committee will be able to consider this matter at its April 14 meeting. I will be happy to attend, if necessary. Also, I will complete whatever modification required by the Committee and supply you with three copies of the final proposal.
