Changes to Minor in Business

CURRICULUM CHANGE

- 1) Replace Principles of Management (0506.203) with Organizational Behavior (0506.300 or 0506.309) as a required course for the Business minor.
- 2) Change General Education prerequisite requirement from Computer Literacy (0701.100) to Computing Environments (0701.200)

SPONSOR: Jooh Lee, Management/MIS Department

CURRICULAR EFFECT: Two courses towards the minor in Business would be replaced by two other courses taught by the same departments.

ADEQUACY OF PRESENT STAFF, RESOURCES, ETC.: This change has no impact on the number of sections taught by the existing faculty. Therefore, adequacy of resources is not an issue for this curriculum change.

RATIONALE:


- 1) In a separate curriculum change proposal, Principles of Management is removed from the Business curriculum. Therefore, we cannot require students pursuing a minor in Business to take this course.
- 2) Computer Literacy is no longer an approved General Education Computer Science option under the current guide. Computing Environments is the standard for the Business majors and as such it has been the de facto standard for Business minors since Fall 1999. This minor curricular change will make this an official Business minor course.

RESULTS OF CONSULTATION: Written consultations have been requested from the three Department Chairs in the College of Business, and from the Chair of the Computer Science Department.

We've got a proposed curriculum change for Spring 2001 that needs a consultation letter from you. It relates to students who are pursuing a minor in Business. They currently are supposed to take Computer Literacy (0701100) but we want them to take Computing Environments (0701200) instead.
