II. COURSE:

1. Undergraduate course
2. Number of Hours Credit: 3
3. Course Level: F, S, Jr., S.
4. Prerequisite: None
5. Position: This is an undergraduate Spanish credit course designed to broaden the student's knowledge of Spanish Civilization and the Role of the Spanish.
6. Suggested Time of Implementation: Fall, 1975

III. OTHER REASONS:

1. Staff and Facilities: A qualified member of the Foreign Language Department will teach this course.
2. Library Facilities and Books: Already adequate
3. Space Needs: Any alternate
4. Uniqueness: Although a Spanish-American Civilization course is offered in Spanish, there is no course in Spanish-American Civilization and Culture offered in English at Cleveland State College.
5. Specific Objectives: To acquaint the student with Spanish-American Civilization and Culture as an integral part of the world; to increase disciplinary knowledge; to appreciate the similarities and differences, differences, and similarities of the Spanish-American continent; to improve the ability to communicate with Spanish-speaking people living in the United States; to increase the student's knowledge of the culture and civilization of the Caribbean area, Central, and South America.

IV. RATIONALE:

The Civilization and Culture of Spanish America is an extremely important in the United States. The Latin American people have a deep, dignified, and conscious awareness which differs from the geographic region of the world. Its role is especially unique due to its artistic values and social relevance.

V. CHAIRMAN'S COMMENTS:

This course is proposed as an undergraduate course within the area of General Education, and as a requirement to the Latin American Studies Core program. Several members of the Foreign Language Department are already qualified to teach it, and it is hoped that the course can be offered during the academic school year 1975/76. Library holdings are at present adequate and no special resources will be required.

1. There are already existing courses on campus in
 - a. Latin-American History, b. Geography of Latin-America, and c. Government and Politics of Latin-America.
2. There are already existing courses on the culture and sociology of minority groups which indicate the inclusion of discussion on Spanish-American Peoples.
3. There is no Latin-American Studies Concentration on the list supplied by Dr. Brown.
