Rowan students enrolled in **non-traditional-format programs** are considered **CGCE Extension Students** and they may follow different timelines and deadlines than those listed within this booklet. The College of Graduate & Continuing Education's Extension Division administers Rowan courses and programs that are offered either online, hybrid, off-site, accelerated, or some combination of these. Matriculated CGCE Extension students or those interested in non-traditional Rowan coursework should visit www.rowan.edu/cgce or contact 856-256-5435, cgceacademicservices@rowan.edu for detailed information about courses and about the registration-related policies and deadlines that apply to them.

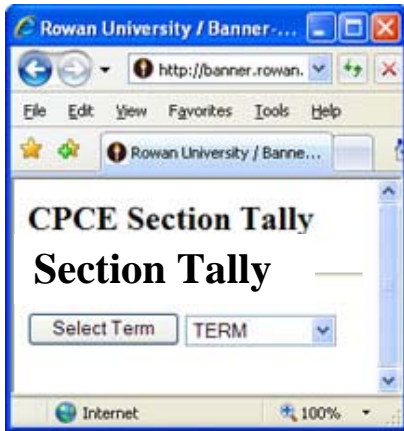
HOW TO SEARCH FOR ROWAN COURSES

Spring 2012 Schedule of Courses

This document is meant to provide all of the registration-related information you will need to find and register for a Rowan University course for the Spring 2012 semester.

To search a listing of Rowan courses you should use the official online **Section Tally** available at http://banner.rowan.edu/reports/reports.pl?task=Section_Tally. Using this online Section Tally ensures that any search for courses you perform always includes the most up-to-the-minute offerings and information.

The Section Tally is organized by term and includes all Rowan course offerings.



Traditional Format Courses: Rowan courses offered in face-to-face settings and on-campus – either at the Main (Glassboro) or Camden location. Except in summer, courses are usually 16 weeks long.

Non-traditional Format Courses: Rowan courses that are either accelerated and/or offered in an alternative mode of delivery such as online/hybrid or off-site. (These courses are administered by the College of Graduate & Continuing Education and are known as “CGCE Extension courses.”) CGCE Extension courses are easily identified in the Section Tally by a letter after the section number in the “Sect” column. CGCE Extension courses do not allow online registration and usually follow different registration and payment deadlines. Using the Section Tally to Search for a Rowan Course

You may use the Section Tally to search for courses by term and then you may narrow that search by a number of options such as specific college or department. The Section Tally lists all registration-related information for each course including start and end dates, meeting days and times, location, mode of delivery (hybrid, online, etc.) instructor, pre-requisites/restrictions, and whether or not there is any space available in the class.

The Section Tally is easy to use. Follow the steps/tips below to search for courses.

- Go to http://banner.rowan.edu/reports/reports.pl?task=Section_Tally. Once there, select the term of interest and then click “Select Term.” It will bring you to a simple search page.
- Enter any search criteria you would like although it is recommended that you not narrow the search too much. Once you have entered your criteria, press ‘Search.’ A list of courses matching your criteria will then pop up at the bottom of the screen.
- The list will have the header shown below and includes the pertinent information about the course.

The max enrollment is "0" so this course requires manual registration.

This is a CGCE Extension course that will run for 7-8 weeks.

Tips for Navigating the Section Tally

- **CRN:** The first column displays the CRN (Course Registration Number). This is the number you will need to register for the course.
- **Subj:** This is the subject code for the course.
- **Crse:** This is the official course number.
- **Sect:** This is the section number of the course. (Remember, a CGCE Extension course will have a letter after the section number.)
- **Part of Term:** This indicates when a course begins and ends; therefore, it will also let you know which registration deadline to follow. (Registration and payment deadlines for traditional format classes are listed in the beginning of this document. Registration and payment deadlines for non-traditional format or CGCE Extension classes are listed at www.rowan.edu/cgce.)
- **Session:** This indicates whether a course is Day, Evening, Weekend, Web-Assisted, Online or Hybrid.
- **Title:** This is the abbreviated title of the course. It is also important to check this column for any special information such as skipped classes, unique meeting locations, or additional registration instructions.
- **Prof:** This is the last name of the course instructor. (If “Staff” is listed, an instructor name is pending.)
- **Day, Beg, End, Bldg, Room:** This column will include the following:
 - The day(s) of the week the class is held: M, T, W, R (Thursday) F, S, U (Sunday).
 - The beginning and ending times for the class. (Military time is used.)
 - The building the class is in if on Rowan’s campus (or sometimes a partner campus). Check within this document for a key to Rowan building codes and a campus map.
 - The room the class is in if on Rowan’s campus (or sometimes a partner campus).
- **Campus:** This indicates the location of the course *if* it is offered on a college campus. This could be a Rowan campus such as “Main” which is Glassboro or our “Camden” Campus. It also might list one of our partner campuses such as Cumberland County-Vineland or Camden County-Blackwood. Additional details about a meeting location (if needed) are included in the Title column.
- **AddInfo:** This is a location where additional information about the course might be listed.
 - CGCE Extension uses this column and a “Materials Required” link to list the texts for the course. If there is a link in this column, click on it, and it will bring you to a page that lists detailed textbook information. (If there is no link for “Materials Required” and it is a CGCE Extension class, this means your texts are not yet posted but should be soon.)
 - Unless notified otherwise, all texts may be purchased through the Rowan Bookstore in person or online at <http://rowanbookstore.bncollege.com>.
- **Hrs:** This indicates the course’s number of semester hours (credit hours).
- **Max:** This indicates the maximum number of “seats” (space available) in the class.
 - This will often be listed as zero (“0”) for any course that requires manual registration, which includes all CGCE Extension classes. For such a class, check with the instructor/dept. (if traditional format) or CGCE at cgceenrollment@rowan.edu (if a CGCE Extension class) to request to register for the course or confirm availability.
- **Avail:** This indicates the number of spots/spaces available in the class at that time. (This is up-to-the-minute information; but remember, sometimes these spots can fill up quickly. If you want to be registered for the class, don’t delay!)
 - This will often be listed as zero (“0”) or a negative number for any course that requires manual registration, which includes all CGCE Extension classes. For such a class, check with the instructor (if traditional format) or CGCE at cgceenrollment@rowan.edu (if a CGCE Extension class) to request to register for the course or confirm availability.
 - On the main Section Tally page (http://banner.rowan.edu/reports/reports.pl?task=Section_Tally), you can also perform a search for only those courses that have space available; however, be very careful using this search because all CGCE Extension courses and many other courses that require manual registration will not appear even if space is available in the class.
 - Keep in mind that sometimes for CGCE Extension courses, it may appear in the Tally that there are spots available; however many of those spots may be reserved for pending admitted students. The only way to truly know if there are spots available in a CGCE Extension course is to submit a signed Override form (www.rowan.edu/cgce/forms) to CGCE.
- **Room Cap:** If the room in which the course is located is on a Rowan campus, the maximum capacity for the room is listed here.

How to Access Additional Course Details in the Section Tally

- Search for those **courses that fulfill a particular Basic Skills, General Education or Rowan Experience Requirement:** To perform this search, click on the “Attribute” search box on the main Section Tally page and it will list all options. (More details about these requirements are included within this document and at www.rowan.edu/registrar.)

Click on the CRN (the number in the first column on the left in the Section Tally) and it will bring you to a new page that lists additional details about each class including:

- **Official name of the class**
- A link (“View Catalog Entry”) to the official **course catalog description** for the class
- **Costs:** If the course is a CGCE Extension course, the costs will be listed on this page. (Costs for traditional-format courses are included on the Bursar webpage at www.rowan.edu/bursar.)
- **Course Prerequisites and/or Restrictions:**
 - If the course is a CGCE Extension course, any prerequisites or restrictions limiting enrollment in the course will be listed at the bottom of the page that appears after you first clicked the CRN. For matriculated CGCE Extension students, your Personalized Course Sequence (PCS) is the best place to view pre-reqs for your courses.
 - If the course is a traditional-format course, you will need to click the CRN from the main Section Tally page and then click the link for the name of the course itself at the top of the next page that appears. This will then bring you another detail page that lists any prerequisites or restrictions limiting enrollment in that course.

Once you have chosen your course(s) and have the CRN(s), you are ready to register.

(To register for traditional-format courses, refer to “Registration Procedures” within this document.)

Non-matriculated students register starting November 14.

Students who need to process prerequisite waivers, faculty overrides, or permission to take over 18 credits can only process these requests during the normal working hours of the Office of the Registrar, Monday through Friday, 8:00am – 4:30pm, or Wednesday until 6pm. **If you have any problems, call the Office of the Registrar on your scheduled registration day for assistance.**

Individuals who wish to enroll in an undergraduate course(s) for the Spring 2012 semester, **and have never applied or attended**, must call the Office of the Registrar between 8:00am – 4pm, Monday through Friday. Please call (856) 256-4360 so a staff member can activate you in our Student Records System. You must be a part of the Student Records System before you can register via Student Self-Service. Newly admitted, not enrolled students will receive a special invitation for orientation and registration.

Final Grades:

Grades are available, once they are posted by faculty and stored in your academic history, by logging in to the Student Self-Service system and accessing “Student Records” under the “Student and Financial Aid” menu. **Final Grades will only be mailed to students with a GPA under 2.00, who are not on Denial of Services.**

Please call (856) 256-4360 so a staff member can enter your information in our Student Records System. You must be a part of the Student Records System before you can utilize the registration via Student Self-Service. Newly admitted, not enrolled students will receive special information about orientation and registration.

Students enrolled in courses that meet once a week on Mondays, are permitted to drop/add courses through the Tuesday following their first meeting.

Students registering during Final Schedule Adjustment (Drop/Add), via Student Self-Service or In-Person (processing forms), must pay their tuition bill at the time of registration or their classes will be canceled.

NO BILLS WILL BE MAILED

**Students registering for Spring 2012 classes for the first time, or those that have been dropped for non-payment and are re-registering, on or after January 4, 2012 are considered late registrants and may be assessed a \$75 late registration fee.*

*** Registration in Savitz is for processing forms only (faculty overrides, prerequisite waivers, permission to take over 18 credits, etc.)*

All other registration must be done via Student Self-Service.

In rare and compelling instances, students may be considered for registration after the Drop/Add period has been completed. Special permission is required. Forms are available in the Office of the Registrar.

CERTIFICATION, MATRICULATED GRADUATE, AND DOCTORAL STUDENTS
MAY REGISTER DURING ANY EARLY REGISTRATION PERIOD.

Student Self Service is available for all currently enrolled students (consult the registration calendar for specific dates and times). Make certain ALL financial or academic "hold flags" have been removed. While the system will identify "hold flags" and provide direction toward resolution, the flag must be removed by the appropriate office to permit access to Student Self Service registration.

If you encounter any problems, call the Office of the Registrar (856) 256-4360, between 8:00am and 4:30pm **on your scheduled day.**

**We encourage you to register during your assigned times.

STUDENT SELF SERVICE INSTRUCTIONS

1. Meet with your program advisor to select courses and review prerequisites before registering.
2. **Click "Access Banner Services."**
3. Enter your Rowan ID as User ID. (If you don't know your Rowan ID, go to <http://www.rowan.edu/mybanner>)
4. Enter your PIN. **If this is your FIRST TIME logging in to the Self Service system, your PIN will be your 6-digit birthday, in the format MMDDYY.** (If you don't know your PIN, go to <http://www.rowan.edu/mybanner>)
5. Click "Login." **(First time users will see a screen that says "Your PIN has expired." Please follow the prompts to set a permanent PIN.)**
6. For first time login, you will be prompted to set a security question.
7. To change PIN or security question, select "Personal Information."
8. To register, select "Student & Financial Aid."
9. Click "Registration."
10. Click "Add or Drop Classes."
11. Select the semester (term) you are registering for, and "Submit."
12. Enter the **five-digit course reference number (CRN)** of the courses you want and click the "submit changes" button.
13. Classes that were accepted will be listed first, classes closed or that you are not eligible to register for will be displayed second, and additional blank boxes will be at the bottom for adding more courses.

When you are finished, be sure to click "Exit" at the top right of any screen. This will prevent others from accessing your personal information.

CGCE Registration: All matriculated CGCE Extension students are registered manually by CGCE for Ext. courses. (There are some exceptions to this and any questions about CGCE registration should be sent to cgceenrollment@rowan.edu.)

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

Audit Policy

A student who wishes to attend a particular course and not receive credit may do so by registering *in person* during **Final Registration or Drop/Add**, at the Office of the Registrar. The designation AU for that course will be recorded on the student's transcript. No change in designation may be made after the end of drop/add. The auditor may or may not choose to do the required course work, but in either event will receive neither grade nor credit. Courses taken under audit do not count in defining full-time/part-time status nor are such courses considered in determining financial aid or veterans benefits nor do these courses count toward degree requirements. Although courses taken for audit do not count for credit toward graduation requirements, a student may receive credit by taking the course again for credit. The use of audit is not permitted for private lessons for credit offered in the Department of Music, for internships, student teaching or for independent study.

Course Overrides

To enroll in a closed course you must process a Professor's Request to Override a Closed Course form during a ny registration period. **Overrides for closed courses must be processed in the Office of the Registrar during regular office hours. The Override Form is not accepted by the Registrar if any alterations have been made and/or the Drop/Add period has ended.**

HELP

Students experiencing difficulties with Student Self Service should immediately call the Office of the Registrar (856) 256-4360 during regular business hours (Monday - Friday, 8:00am - 4:30pm, closed Fridays in the summer). If a student has a **LOST SCHEDULE**, a duplicate copy can be printed via Student Self Service. Student Self Service can be accessed through any computer with Internet access. See page 4 for instructions.

Maximum Semester Enrollment

Matriculated undergraduate students - 18 S.H.

Non-matriculated undergraduate students - 11.5 S.H.

Requests to exceed maximum semester hours of enrollment are subject to the approval of the appropriate College Dean. If the request is granted, it must be submitted in writing to the Office of the Registrar and the extra course(s) must be added prior to the end of the Drop/Add period.

Prerequisite Requirements for Course Registrations

It is the student's responsibility to meet required prerequisites for each registered course. Students not meeting specific prerequisites will not be permitted to enroll in the course. In order to enroll in a course when the prerequisite has not been met, the student must seek approval from his/her academic advisor and department chairperson. Students from other institutions should provide documentation of meeting prerequisites to the College offering the course. The required authorization form should be filled out by the College and presented, by the student, at the time of registration.

Repeating a Course

In the event that a student must or voluntarily chooses to repeat a course, the grade received for the repeated course will constitute the final grade for that subject for cumulative GPA purposes - whether the grade is higher or lower than the grade received in the original course.

The original grade, although not counted in the cumulative GPA, remains on the student's transcript. Herein, the University stipulates that the same course may not be taken more than twice, including withdraws. However, except for general education courses, further restrictions may be determined by the individual departments/colleges, only to meet standards recommended by accrediting bodies, statutory regulations, and/or professional societies. Appeals may be made through the normal appeals process.

Tuition payment (*Early and Extended Registration*)

Tuition charges may be viewed online during the dates indicated on page 1. If you are registered and no charge appears, contact the Office of the Registrar (856) 256-4360. Tuition payments and/or arrangements not made by the due date may result in the cancellation of your courses.* Financial Aid students with an amount due of zero must confirm their registration (by the due date) on Student Self Service.

***A student wishing to re-register after cancellation may do so, from available courses, during Final Registration (with a late fee).**

Tuition Payment (*Final Registration and Drop/Add*)

Students registering during these periods (Student Self Service and In-Person) must pay their tuition and fees at the **time of registration** or their classes will be cancelled. **NO BILLS WILL BE MAILED.**

Payment of Tuition and Fees *with Credit Cards*

Payment can be made with American Express, Visa, MasterCard, or Discover credit cards. Under no circumstances should any credit card be sent through the mail. **You may pay on the web at www.rowan.edu/bursar.**

For CGCE students, it is your responsibility to pay your online account via SELF SERVICE. (<http://www.rowan.edu/selfservice>)

NON-MATRICULATED STUDENTS

(Not admitted to a degree or certification program)

Undergraduate Courses: (Max. of 11.5 S.H. per semester or 24 S.H. total)

May register for undergraduate courses during the Extended Registration period. See pages 2 - 4 for details. Non-matriculated students are not permitted to accumulate more than a total of 24 undergraduate credits prior to formal acceptance into an undergraduate degree program. Transcript evaluation can only be completed after acceptance to the University through the admissions process. Contact Admissions at (856) 256-4200.

Graduate Courses:

- Before matriculation, most non-matriculated students presenting proof of the receipt of an undergraduate degree, may accumulate up to 9 S.H. of graduate credits.
- Only matriculated students may take 9 credits or more per semester.
- Non-matriculated students may not take courses restricted to majors.
- Students matriculated in the Post-Baccalaureate teacher certification program are permitted to register for one 3 credit graduate course during a single semester, not to exceed a total of 6 credits overall.
- Upon submission of evidence of a previously earned master's degree and upon approval by the Graduate School, most post-master's students may be permitted to accumulate up to 12 credits that apply to any one graduate degree program before being matriculated.
- Rowan University undergraduate students who have completed at least 90 credits with a GPA of 3.0 or above may, with appropriate approvals, register for 3 credits of graduate coursework per semester, not to exceed a total of 6 credits overall.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Academic Dismissal/Warning Policy

Rowan University has established standards for academic standing which apply to all matriculated undergraduate students as follows: Students who have earned 15 or more semester hour credits and have a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of at least 2.0 are considered to be in good academic standing. Academic Stop Out Policy

Any matriculated undergraduate student who does not register for two consecutive regular academic semesters will lose matriculated status at the end of the drop/add period of the third semester. Such students must then apply for readmission to the University and to a major program, and meet any new program requirements that have been officially instituted.

Admission to Courses

Enrollment in undergraduate courses is open to qualified high school graduates or holders of state certificates of equivalency. Undergraduate students who wish to register for a graduate level course must obtain permission from the Dean of The Graduate School. (Restrictions apply.) The requirements for admission to undergraduate and graduate degree or certification programs (matriculation) may be obtained by contacting the Office of Admissions or The Graduate School.

Admission to a Closed Section

Registration for a closed section can be accomplished only if the signed **Professor's Request To Override A Closed Course** form is returned to the Registrar's Office during any registration period. **The Registrar does not accept the Override Form if any alterations have been made and/or the Drop/Add period has ended.**

Class Attendance

Students are expected to be present at each scheduled class for which they are officially registered. Rowan's "community of learners" can be realized only when teachers and learners interact in the ways deemed appropriate for any particular class. Because Rowan recognizes diversity in both teaching and learning styles--and even course design and delivery--rules may vary with the learning experience, e.g., online or distance learning courses.

Faculty members establish the parameters of a particular learning experience, and are therefore expected to maintain the efficiency of the community and to keep accurate attendance records. Faculty are also expected to counsel students who develop a pattern of excessive and unexplained absences, and to request assistance from the Dean of Students if the pattern of absences continues.

Students who are absent for reasons of illness, death in the family, inclement weather, religious observances, official University activities, or for matters of personal conscience should inform each of their instructors, ideally with a written excuse, before the fact or as soon as possible thereafter. Except in cases when classroom experiences can not be repeated, faculty may provide these students the opportunity to make up written work, tests or other assignments at the earliest possible convenient time.

In any event, faculty members are under no obligation to make special provisions for students absent for reasons other than those listed above.

Faculty may establish additional attendance criteria which are consistent with the above paragraphs. In learning communities where attendance is critical to the functioning of the group, the rationale and justification for additional attendance requirements must be part of the syllabus provided for students prior to the end of the drop/add period.

Non-attendance does not constitute a drop or withdraw. The student is financially and academically responsible for the timely completion of correct schedule adjustment procedures.

Department Approval to Attend Commencement with Outstanding Degree Requirements

The commencement ceremony is held in May. To be eligible to walk in the commencement ceremony, an undergraduate student must be within 12 credits of graduating and/or the completion of student teaching. Graduate students must be within 6 credit course work must be completed during the Summer, and student teaching by the end of the Fall semester. Students are responsible for submitting a completed Department Approval form. **Note:** Department Approvals must be submitted by April 15. Participating at Commencement **does not mean that you have graduated.** Degree conferral occurs when all requirements are completed and an Application for Graduation and Degree Conferral has been submitted to the Office of the Registrar. Please note that your final grade point average is not calculated until you graduate; therefore, if you 'Walk at Commencement' prior to completing your coursework and applying for graduation, you cannot walk with honors.

Graduation and Teacher Certification

All students planning to complete degree and/or certification requirements at the end of the semester must submit appropriate applications before the filing deadline (see cover page for dates). Diplomas will be available approximately 8 weeks after the end of the term. Applications are available in-person, or, for Graduation, visit <http://www.rowan.edu/provost/registrar/forms>, and for Certification, visit <http://www.rowan.edu/colleges/education/certification>.

Identification Cards

All students are required to have a Rowan Student Identification Card. This picture identification card enables the student to use all campus facilities and services as well as identifying the student as part of the University community. In addition, this card serves as a meal card, debit card and library card. To obtain a proper identification card, students must appear in person at the Student Center Identification Room where staff will verify their student status in Rowan's computer system. The fee is \$10.00 for a new card and \$25.00 to replace a lost or stolen card. To report a lost or stolen card, call (856)-256-GONE. The I.D. Room hours are 8:30 am to 4:30 pm, Monday through Friday.

Late Payment Charges and Returned Check Fees

Fees for late payments will be \$25.00 if paid within two weeks, \$35.00 if paid within three weeks, and \$50.00 if paid thereafter.

When the bank returns a student's personal check to the University for reasons of insufficient funds, stop payment, etc., a returned check fee of \$25.00 per check is charged to the student's account. The student is billed for the original charge and the returned check fee(s). Unpaid accounts are subsequently assessed the appropriate late payment charge(s).

New Jersey Residency Requirement

A student must be a bona fide resident of New Jersey for twelve (12) months prior to the first day of classes in order to qualify for resident tuition charges. Legal documents will be required to substantiate any claim. Copies of the laws governing residency are available in the Office of the Registrar.

Notice to Students Regarding Provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords students certain rights with respect to their education records. They are:

(1) The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of the day the University receives a request for access.

Students should submit to the registrar, dean, head of the academic department, or other appropriate official, written requests that identify the record(s) they wish to inspect. The University official will make arrangements for access and notify the student of the time and place where the records may be inspected. If the records are not maintained by the University official to whom the request was submitted, that official shall advise the student of the correct official to whom the request should be addressed.

(2) The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the student believes are inaccurate or misleading.

Students may ask the University to amend a record that they

believe is inaccurate or misleading. They should write the University official responsible for the record, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate or misleading.

If the University decides not to amend the record as requested by the student, the University will notify the student of the decision and advise the student of his or her right to a hearing regarding the request for a amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the student when notified of the right to a hearing.

(3) The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.

One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the University in an administrative, supervisory, academic or research, or support staff position (including law enforcement unit personnel and health staff); a person or company with whom the University has contracted (such as an attorney, auditor, or collection agent); a person serving on the Board of Trustees; or a student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks.

A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.

(4) The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by Rowan University to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA are:

Public Notice--Designating Directory Information

Rowan University has designated the following categories of student information as **Directory Information**. Such information may be disclosed by the institution.

Category I: Name, address, telephone number, email address, dates of enrollment, class, Rowan email address.

Category II: Major field of study, awards, honors (includes Dean's List), degree(s) conferred (including dates).

Category III: Past and present participation in officially recognized sports and activities, physical factors (height, weight of athletes), date and place of birth.

Students who desire to withhold the disclosure of any category of information must provide written notification to the Office of the Dean of Students each year by the first week in October. Forms are available in the Dean's Office.

Rowan University assumes the failure on the part of a student to specifically request the withholding of categories of **Directory Information** indicates individual approval for disclosure.

WITHDRAW POLICY

Registration in a given Rowan University course implies the student's obligation to complete its requirements. Provisions for withdraw are made for special circumstances. Except in extreme circumstances when the department chair and the dean of a particular college allow, students are not permitted to withdraw from the same course more than two (2) times.

Withdraw From A Course(s)*

**If you are a matriculated undergraduate student and you are withdrawing from your last class for the current semester, you must contact the Counseling and Psychological Services Center.*

1. During Drop/Add

Courses can be dropped by Student Self Service. Any course dropped during the Drop/Add period will not be recorded on the permanent record.

2. Between Drop/Add and Mid-Term

A Withdraw Request Form must be secured from the Office of the Registrar. The reason for the request **may** be stated on the form and must be signed by the student and the professor, with the last date of attendance indicated. Upon receipt of the form, the Office of the Registrar will enter a (W) on the student transcript.

3. After Mid-Term

The same process as #2 will prevail except that the reason **must** be stated and approval obtained from the professor and the respective department chairperson. If the professor approves the withdraw, he/she will indicate that the student is either withdrawing with a passing academic standing (WP) or withdrawing with academic failure (WF) and also provide the last date of attendance.

4. During the Last Four Weeks of the Semester

Withdraw must be considered exceptional and may occur only with the approval of the Professor, Department Chairperson and College Dean and only for good and sufficient reasons beyond the control of the student. (WP/WF remains in effect, as does the last date of attendance.) Forms are available from the Dean of the College in which the course is being offered.

Withdraw From the University

If for some reason a student decides to withdraw from the University, the following steps must be taken:

1. Obtain an official Withdraw Form from the Associate Vice President for Residential Learning and Dean of Students Office in Savitz Hall. It is the responsibility of the student to take this form to each office designated to complete the withdraw procedure.
2. If, for reasons of illness, the student cannot return to the campus, the student should write a letter of withdraw in which the student gives his/her full name, home address, Rowan ID number, effective date of the withdraw, and reason(s) for such action.

GUIDELINES FOR STATE RESIDENCY TUITION

A student must be a legal resident of New Jersey for a period of not less than 12 consecutive months prior to the first day of classes in order to qualify for state resident tuition. The "residence" of a student is defined in terms of the student's "domicile," which is the student's permanent, true and fixed home, to which he or she intends to return whenever absent. University decisions with regard to a student's residence are governed by the standards set out at N.J.S.A. 18A:62-4, N.J.A.C. 9A:5-1.1 et seq. and N.J.A.C. 9A:9-2.6. A student can seek reconsideration of the University's decision pursuant to the procedures set out in the student handbook.

General Education at Rowan University

Students need to understand that a well-rounded education is a goal in itself and that there are important aspects of this education that the university as a whole wants to emphasize. These aspects include a thorough grounding in communication and an exposure to university level science, mathematics, social and behavioral science, and the humanities.

Broadly speaking, the general education program will:

1. Develop students' abilities to speak and write effectively, think clearly and critically
2. Develop students' abilities to use computational, quantitative, and problem solving skills, as well as scientific thinking and modes of inquiry
3. Increase students' understanding of the complexity of issues in humanities, arts, social and behavioral sciences and the practice of free inquiry in their analyses and examination of values.
4. Provide opportunities for students to explore specializations, concentrations, minors, or disciplines outside of their own in greater depth.

As one of the fundamental principles of a general education curriculum is to experience a variety of disciplines, students are required to take courses from five areas: Communication, Math, and Science, Social Behavioral Sciences, History, Humanities and Language, and Non-Program Courses.

At Rowan University, the minimum number of hours required for a four-year degree is 120 semester hours, and all students are required to earn a combined total of 42 semester hours of General Education and Rowan Experience courses. (The Rowan Experience Requirements are described in detail in the next section.) However, these are just minimums as different degree programs vary significantly in the number of hours required for Free Electives and the Major. Students must plan their program of study in consultation with an advisor in order to meet all the requirements of a specific major program.

Requirements of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, and Specialized Programs by General Education, Free electives, and Major Requirements

The minimum requirements for the Bachelor of Arts degree, the Bachelor of Science degree, and Specialized Programs such as the Bachelor of Fine Arts degree are shown below. For the Bachelor of Arts degree, it is necessary to complete a minimum of 51 semester hours of courses in General Education in order to achieve the minimum 120 hours required for the degree. In specialized programs, the courses required in the major may far exceed 60 semester hours of credit and there may be 0 hours of Free Electives required.

Within General Education, there are specific areas of study or discipline groups. All of the semester hours requirements listed below are considered minimum requirements. Specific requirements may vary by degree type (Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science) and/or by major program of study.

General Education Requirements by Area of Study

Following are the minimum numbers of credits required in each of five areas of study within General Education. In addition to meeting the minimum credit hours in each bank, students must earn a COMBINED TOTAL of 42 credits of General Education courses and Rowan Experience courses.

These are minimum requirements for each area of study or discipline group. Specific major programs may expand the requirements within any of these categories in order to meet program and learning outcome objectives as well as meeting the minimum 120 semester hour requirement for a four-year degree. Specific General Education courses may be required for individual majors if they serve as prerequisites for required courses within that major.

General Education courses must be selected so that the following requirements are satisfied:

1. All students must take College Composition I (3 semester hours) or Integrated College Composition I (4 semester hours) as well as College Composition II (3 semester hours).
2. The minimum of 6 s.h. of Communications is fulfilled by College Composition I and II. For all other banks requiring 6 or more semester hours, students must take courses from at least two different disciplines within the bank.
3. All students must take at least one course from the list of mathematics courses listed under Science and Mathematics.
4. All students must take at least one approved course that includes an in-class laboratory experience (LAB) under Science and Mathematics. Transfer courses must include the in-class lab experience. Students may not test out of the lab experience (CLEP).
5. All students must demonstrate computer literacy by passing the University Computer Competency Exam or completing a computer competency course by the end of their freshman year. Transfer students must meet this requirement before the end of their first semester at Rowan University. Advanced computer competency courses may be required of specific programs.
6. All courses at the university can be used in the Non Program Bank, as long as they are not courses in the major program of the student.

Students Transferring from a New Jersey Community College to Rowan University

Students who have completed an Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degree at a New Jersey community college will receive at least 60 hours of transferrable credit towards the appropriate Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science Program. With regard to General Education, it is assumed that transfer students will have met all lower division General Education requirements expected of students having completed the first two years of a four-year program. In most situations, students will receive transfer credit for a combination of General Education Courses, Rowan Experience Courses, Free Electives, and Major Requirements totally at least 60 semester hours of credit or approximately one-half of a basic four-year degree. Exceptions to this assumption will occur when students have failed to complete required course work at the community college that is required for entrance into a required Rowan University course. Coordination between the student and advisor at the community college is necessary in planning for the transfer to Rowan University. Specific program requirements on the

Rowan University home page.

For students transferring to the university without completing an Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degree, it is expected that credits taken at a New Jersey community college that are applicable to an Associate of Arts or and Associate of Science degree, up to a maximum of 60-64 semester hours will be transferable to the basic four-year degree program at Rowan University. Transfer students must meet the specific graduation requirements of the Rowan University degree program to which they seek to transfer. It is expected that through careful planning, the transfer student will be able to meet these requirements within their two years of study at the community college and the following two years of study at Rowan University.

General Education Requirements

General Education is designed to fulfill the aim of a liberal education. It is intended to provide the breadth of knowledge and balance of judgment befitting a college graduate, regardless of major. At Rowan University, General Education is divided into five areas of study with specific goals. The educational goals of the five areas of study are:

Communication Bank Goals

1. Students will develop the ability to write a structured, well-reasoned, ordered and grammatically correct document appropriate to the intended audience.
2. Students will develop the ability to research and properly reference the work of others.

Mathematics and Science Bank Goals

1. Students will demonstrate an ability to identify and apply fundamental concepts in science and math.
2. Students will demonstrate an ability to collect, interpret and verify lab data.
3. Students will demonstrate an ability to analyze and manipulate data, access and organize information.

History, Humanities, and Languages Bank Goals

1. Students will demonstrate an understanding of major concepts, theories, and methods in at least two areas of history, humanities, culture, or world languages.
2. Students will develop an understanding of systems of thought and language.

Social and Behavioral Sciences Bank Goals

1. Students will demonstrate an understanding of major concepts, theories, and methods in at least two areas of the social and behavioral sciences.
2. Students will demonstrate an understanding of the development of human society as it relates to culture, geography, and language in the context of an emerging interdependent, global community.
3. Students will demonstrate an ability to apply basic methodologies used in the measurement of social and behavioral sciences.

Non-Program Electives Bank Goals

1. To develop a deeper understanding of at least one area outside of the major program of study as a means of creating a broader, customized, and complete program of general education.
2. To enhance the major degree program and better prepare to meet future professional and life objectives.

Some general courses offered at Rowan University fulfill one or more of the Rowan Experience Requirements, or are applicable to the Honors Concentration, or meet a combination of General Education, Rowan Experience, and Honors Concentration Requirements. Such courses are signified as follows:

(ACE) Artistic and Creative Experience

- (H) Honors Concentration Course
- (LIT) Broad-based literature course
- (LAB) In-class laboratory experience

The Rowan Experience

Rowan Experience Requirements All students must take courses that define the unique aspects of a Rowan University degree and are described as the Rowan Experience. The Rowan Experience consists of courses that require a demonstration of specific skills or provide specific kinds of experiences that the university deems significant for all graduates. All students must complete a course or series of courses with the following six Rowan Experience designations during their four year education:

1. Artistic and Creative Experience (**ACE**)
2. Literature (**LIT**)
3. Multicultural/Global (**M/G**)
4. Public Speaking (**PS**)
5. Rowan Seminar (**RS**). Rowan Seminars are to be taken by all FRESHMEN. This requirement is waived for transfer students entering with sophomore, junior or senior standing.
6. Writing Intensive (**WI**). Writing Intensive courses **MUST** be taken at Rowan, and College Composition II or its equivalent must be completed prior to enrolling in a (WI) course.

Many courses are designated as ACE, LIT, M/G, PS, WI, and RS, including many General Education courses and many courses taken only by students within their designated major. Courses may also carry more than one designation so that one course may meet two or more Rowan Experience requirements as well as General Education or major requirements.

As noted in the previous section, **all students must take a minimum of 42 credits of General Education and Rowan Experience courses.** The purpose of this requirement is to ensure a broad-based education. Consequently, M/G, LIT, ACE, PS, WI and RS courses that are taken within the major program of study **DO NOT COUNT** towards this minimum total of 42 credits. Note, too, that General Education and Rowan Experience course requirements vary depending on the specific degree program, so students should plan their program of study in consultation with their academic advisors.

The specific goals of the Rowan Experience Requirements are:

1. Help first year students make a smooth academic transition to the university community, serious scholarship and the life of the mind (RS).
2. Develop the ability to give oral presentations on a variety of subjects that are well reasoned, ordered, correct, and appropriate for the intended audience (PS).
3. Have students explore the diverse ways in which human beings have confronted the perennial questions of human existence through various imaginative and discursive literary works (LIT).
4. Develop students' knowledge of the multi-faceted culture in which we live, contemporary social and cultural milieu, and the global implications of an increasingly interdependent and multicultural world (MG).
5. Develop the ability to create and/or critically evaluate works of art through experiential courses designed to expose students to the plastic and performing arts (ACE).

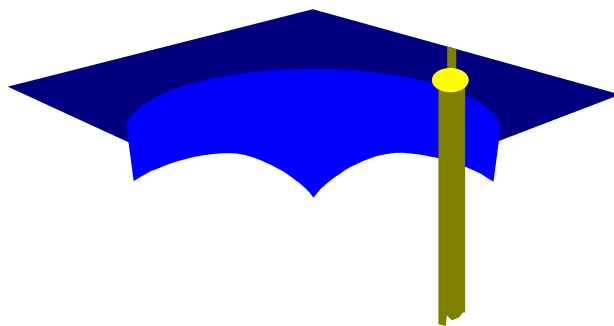

If you are eligible for degree conferral Spring 2012, you **must** file an *Application For Graduation* between October 1, 2011 – December 31, 2011. Apply online via Student Self Service.

If you are eligible to graduate in the year 2012, you need to attend to the following:

All students completing degree requirements in the 2012 academic year, and expecting to receive a diploma, must file an application to graduate using the *Apply For Graduation* process available in Student Self Service.

*To participate in the May 2012 ceremony if you are **not** receiving a May 2011 degree: You **must** file a form, available at www.rowan.edu/registrar under the Graduation link, or at the Office of the Registrar, Savitz Hall.

It is recommended you meet with your academic advisor or program coordinator to confirm your eligibility for graduation.

If you will complete a certification program by Spring 2012, you need to attend to the following:

All students completing a Rowan University approved certification program in the 2012-2013 academic year must file the New Jersey *Application For Certification*. Forms are available at the Student Services Office, College of Education, Education Hall, or online at www.rowan.edu/colleges/education/studentservices/certification. The certification fee is required upon submission of the *NJ Application For Certification* form. Directions attached to the *Application For Certification* list all certificates and their fees.

It is recommended you meet with your academic advisor or program coordinator to confirm your eligibility for certification.

If you will complete a graduate level certificate program (COGS or CAGS) by May 2012, you need to attend to the following:

All students completing a Rowan University approved certificate program (COGS or CAGS) must file an application for completion. Forms are available at www.rowan.edu/provost/registrar/graduation.

It is recommended that you meet with your academic advisor or program coordinator to confirm your eligibility for the certificate.

If you wish to participate in the May 2012 Commencement ceremonies, you must log on to <http://www.rowan.edu/commencement> for information and instructions. It will be necessary for you to complete the participation form in Banner, (Self Service). Commencement updates and schedules will be regularly posted. Congratulations and good luck.

Are you ready to graduate?

Seniors and graduate students, if you think you may be eligible for degree conferral in Spring 2012, you **must** submit an online *Application for Graduation* using Banner Self-Service at www.rowan.edu/selfservice between Oct. 1 and Dec. 31, 2011. Students eligible for May 2012 degree conferral will complete all degree and program requirements by the end of Spring Semester 2012. If you are uncertain about your status, please meet with your academic adviser or program coordinator immediately.

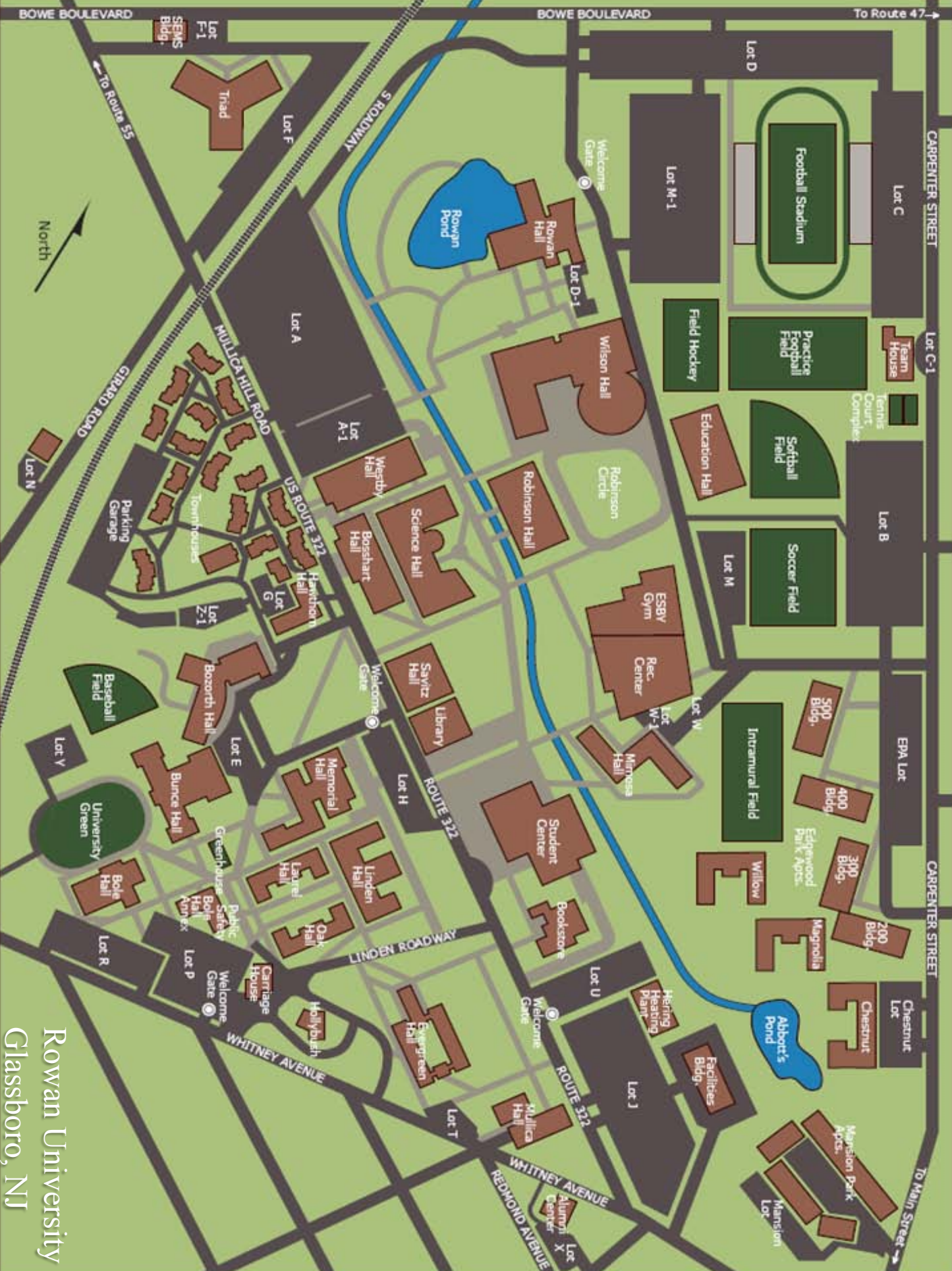


Students completing coursework over the summer or student teaching in the fall may participate in the 2012 Commencement ceremonies. To be eligible, undergraduate students must be within 12 credit hours of graduating and/or the completion of student teaching. Graduate students must be within 6 credit hours. Students meeting these requirements must complete and submit a *Department Approval to Attend Commencement with Outstanding Degree Requirements* paper form to the Office of the Registrar by Thursday, March 15, 2012. Forms can be found at the Office of the Registrar or online at www.rowan.edu/registrar. Meet with your academic adviser or program coordinator early to determine your eligibility.

Preparing for Commencement 2012:

- Complete and submit an online *Application for Graduation* using Banner Self-Service before Dec. 31, 2011 or a *Department Approval to Attend Commencement with Outstanding Degree Requirements* paper form to the Office of the Registrar before March 15, 2012.
 - *Late *Applications for Graduation* will be accepted until Jan. 31, 2012 with a \$45 late fee in addition to the \$65 processing fee.
- Confirm your participation in the 2012 Commencement ceremonies before April 18, 2012.
 - Visit Student Self-Service at www.rowan.edu/selfservice
 - Access Banner Services and enter your Banner ID and PIN
 - Select "Student and Financial Aid" and click on "Commencement"
 - Follow the prompts to confirm your attendance
- Attend the Commencement Student Information Meeting in the Student Center Ballroom on Friday, Jan. 20, 2012 from 1:45-2:45 p.m. to learn important Commencement information, including tickets, caps and gowns, procedures and line-up.
- Visit www.rowan.edu/commencement for detailed information about deadlines, requirements and Commencement day activities.
- Attend Grad Fair to purchase your cap and gown from the Bookstore between April 2-5 from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.
- Undergraduate students: Pick up your Commencement tickets in Memorial Hall between April 23-26, 2012 from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. **April 26 is the FINAL day to pick up tickets. Tickets will not be available after this day.** (*Graduate students will receive their Commencement tickets in the mail.*)

 - Undergraduate students - Wednesday, May 9 at 1:30 p.m. on the University Green
- Attend Commencement:
